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# **CATON PAST**

Caton lies on the south bank of the River Lune, four miles upstream from Lancaster, where a substantial tributary, the Artle Beck, enters the Lune.



The Parish of Caton-with-Littledale comprises four communities: Town End, (part of present day Caron, near the Croft), Brookhouse, Caton Green hamlet and Littledale.

Over a thousand years ago the Parish Boundaries in the Lune Valley were laid out with great skill so that each village had its share of the riverbank, fisheries, water

meadow for grazing, the lower slopes for plough land and the moors for summer grazing. Caton-with-Littledale Parish follows this plan, extending from the River Lune to Wards Stone, 1836 ft on the Bowland Fells. It covers 8393 acres and lies within the Forest of Bowland, a designated area of outstanding Natural Beauty.

Mesolithic flints found locally show that the area was occupied by hunter-gatherers soon after the end of the last ice Age and hut circles in Littledale show that herdsmen were living high in the fells centuries before the Romans came. There is evidence of Roman-British farmsteads, although it is unlikely there was a village settlement in Roman or earlier times.

The village took shape from 650 AD and Caton is recorded in the Domesday Book of 1086. Caton may have got its name from the Saxons: Cae meant a hedge and ton, a town - i.e. a hedged town, or the village could be named after the warrior Katti.



By the 12<sup>th</sup> century much of the village had been acquired by Cockersands Priory and the layout of the village at this time has been reconstructed from their extensive records. These show that there was already a dam on Artle Beck, at Gresgart, the narrowest point on the Valley. This powered a fulling mill for cleaning wool and a corn mill.

Where the village was mainly agricultural, a cross bow maker, a miller, a brewer, a smith, a carpenter, a hawker and a market trader are also recorded and there must have been a fuller as well.



Specialised agricultural workers included a beekeeper and a shepherd. A hermit woman who lived near the hall and the spiritual needs of the village were met by 2 chaplains and a clerk. Caton was clearly a flourishing village by this time, mainly agricultural but beginning to diversify.

In the 18<sup>th</sup> century Caton was transformed by the industrial

revolution. The leat fed by the ancient dam at Gresgarth was harnessed to [power a series of mills. At one time there were as many as eight mills operating in Caton and the population grew substantially, helped by the construction of the Turnpike Road in 1812 and the arrival of the railway in 1850.



Cotton was the main growth industry in Lancashire, but as the coal seams around Caton were thin and the coal of poor quality the Caton mills adapted by specialising in silk and in flax, the latter particularly for sailcloth. By Nelson's time Caton was one of the major suppliers of sails to both the Royal Navy and the Merchant Navy but as the demand for sail cloth collapsed the mills declined.

**Forge Mill** was in 1756 forging iron for the great iron master John Wilkinson, who made the first iron ship. It was converted to a cotton mill in 1796. At different times silk and flax were

also processed. It became a bobbin mill from 1869-1931. In 1931 the mill closed and the site was left to fall into disrepair. The last use of the mill itself was as a hen house! Conversion into housing was taken in the early 1970s.

**Willow Mill** was built in 1790. The sailcloth made there was supplied to shipyards and docks on the North West coast. Until recently the weather vane on Willow Mill was a



ship in full sail and we still have the Ship Inn. The mill saw many changes in industry and in turn has produced corn, cotton, flax, silk and from 1859-1973 bobbins and brushes. It was last used for medical packaging and after a period of closure it was made into small 'industrial' units/workshops in the 1990s.

**Low Mill** was built in 1784. An apprentice house was built to house 75 orphans, many from Liverpool, who formed half the workforce. Soon it became a little community with its own shoemakers and tailors. Silk working continued at Low Mill until 1861 and cotton working



until 1970. The mill was creatively transformed into housing in the 1990s.

The other mills which are no longer in existence were: Rumble Row Mill, Broadacre; Tarnbeck, Moorside; Crossgyll, Littledale; Grassyard, Quernmore Road and one on Ball Lane.

Caton's rapid expansion meant the population grew to a peak of 1434 in 1851. Numbers fluctuated with workers moving as the fortunes of the mills alternately expanded and declined, but the population remained fairly steady until the after the First World War.

### **Caton Present**

Between the wars Caton grew very slowly, some housing on Copy Lane was built in the 1930s and Fell View estate was built after the Second World War. There was considerable



new housing development in the 1950s and 1960s. In the late 1960s the planning policy was to preserve the character of the village and only in fill housing development has been permitted and there has been a policy of green belt land between Caton and Brookhouse, to preserve the identity of the 2 communities. The population of the Parish today is around 2700.

It is estimated that 70 businesses operate from the parish, including farmers, retailers, small businesses and self employed people operating from their own homes). The majority of people employed work fairly locally, within Lancaster and Morecambe, but a percentage work further a field, commuting daily.

A combination of large scale shopping facilities and modern technology has seen a decrease in local shops and the loss of two banks. However facilities within the village include a post

office, two newsagents, a co-operative store, a general store, a chemist and a herbalist. The village also has two primary schools, five places of worship, three public houses, a library, a health centre and Moor Platt, a residential home for the elderly.



There is a reasonable balance of age groups in the village between young, middle aged and older residents. Activities range from a kid's club/ after school club; a youth centre

through to leisure, recreational and sports facilities for other age groups. May indoor activities take place at the village hall, the Victoria Institute, which also has an excellent information technology centre. A marvellous service is provided by Caton Helping Hands, a group of volunteers who help anyone in need.



The REAL project has identified that more activities are needed for the youth of the village. This was a major concern and young residents have been asked for their ideas.

Other concerns raised through the questionnaire and wish tree of the REAL project were protection of the environment and recycling.

Although theft does occur in the village, fortunately violent crime is not an issue, however villagers would like to see more police presence.

Since the REAL questionnaire was done, there is the threat that Moor Platt will close meaning the loss of care facilities for the elderly.

The future is uncertain. As the population grows and housing units become smaller and there is perhaps some relaxation made in planning, it is likely the village may grow and alter. It is the duty of all of us to ensure this is done properly and to the advantage of the whole community. Any changes should be done under the control of the residents via the Parish Council and other pressure groups.

### Introduction to the REAL Community Audit Techniques

#### Community Exhibition and Visioning day

Organised and publicised by the community steering group, this exhibition event takes place in the parish over the course of a morning or afternoon. The exhibition had two components. Firstly, it aims to record and celebrate the villages past (e.g., its landscape, buildings, history, forgotten festivals, industry, etc.). Secondly, the community is given the opportunity to celebrate what they value about their village today, whatever that may be. The steering group draws together various artifacts, drawings, photographs, old newspaper articles, etc. from various people. They can also ask local groups, organisations and societies to produce their own displays for the event.






#### Wish Tree

This method is designed to provide qualitative data about the things that would improve a person's quality of life in the village. Each person is allowed one cardboard leaf, upon which they write "their wish", i.e. the main thing that would improve their quality of life in their village. The method provides diverse information that is specific to that community. This method is visually appealing, and works extremely well with young people as well as adults.

#### Stick-A-Star

A chart displaying possible statements about how people would like their community to change/improve is set up. Participants are then issued with 3 stars, and asked to place them on the chart, prioritising according to the colour of the star (gold star – top priority, silver star – medium priority, bronze star – lowest priority). The statements can be seen below:



At the end of the event each star is allocated the following points:



The total points for each statement are then calculated. This provides quantitative data indicating prioritization of issues within a particular community.

#### **Snapshot Visioning Workshop**

In the absence of a facilitator, Caton-with-Littledale held a general discussion about issues and concerns, which were raised.

#### Questionnaire

The questionnaire was circulated around Caton-with-Littledale during, prior to and after the event. It is a standard questionnaire that all rural parishes participating in REAL employ. The questions relate to many of the issues raised in the Stick-a-Star method. A Freepost envelope is provided to ensure that it is as easy as possible for the community to fill out and return.

In the initial development of the questionnaire, the following indicators were used:

- The Countryside Agencies Headline Indicators Draft (2000)
- Local quality of life counts A menu of local indicators of sustainable development
- National Strategy for Neighbourhood Renewal
- Best Value Performance Indicators



#### Prescap Young peoples Workshop

As part of the REAL process in Caton work was done with some of the young people in the village. The REAL project believes that getting the opinions of young people is vital as today's youth are tomorrow's future. In Caton the REAL project worked with an organisation called Prescap.

Prescap is an organisation, which uses visual art in a dynamic way to support community development.

Prescap facilitated 2 young people's workshops in Caton-with-Littledale, one in each of the local primary schools. In the session young people were invited to create images of how they would like their village to look, in the form of pictures and collage. These images were then used to see how young people would like to see the parish develop in future.

#### **Results Presentation**

A public meeting was held in September at which the results of the consultation process were fed back to the community. The results were also presented to the Parish Council and the young peoples results were fed back to the Youth & Community Centre's AGM. Three main areas were identified from the results as requiring further action. These key issues were Facilities for young people, traffic and road safety and the environment. At the end of the results presentation people were invited to come forward and join an action group.



When presenting and interpreting the results of the consultation it has been assumed that the results are representative of the range of the community's views. However, it has been recognised that the results actually represent a self-selecting sample of the community, i.e., the results are only representative of those who chose to take part in the consultation process. Also, different methods of consultation appeal to different people. For example, the Wish Tree is often popular with young people, whereas the questionnaire tends to be filled out by adults. For this reason, results from any individual method are not considered in isolation, but together with relevant areas of the other consultation methods used.

Where reference is made to the key discussion points, Wish Tree, Stick-a-Star and the Questionnaire the relevant charts and raw data are included in the back of this report for inspection.



## **Facilities for Young People**

#### **Consultation with Young People**

In addition to the REAL consultation Prescap facilitated a workshop in each of the primary schools. In this section we will first consider the results from the REAL consultation, which was primarily with adults, and then consider the results from the young people's workshop.

#### The REAL Consultation

The issue of facilities for young people was clearly the largest issue to arise from the consultation.

#### Stick-A-Star

The option **Facilities for Young People** emerged as the highest scoring category on the Stick-a-Star chart. 73 points were awarded, claiming 31% of the overall total. This option also received the overwhelming majority of GOLD stars, revealing that for 21 individuals, this option was the highest priority on the chart.

#### Wish Tree

Although there were only 2 wishes, 5% of the total, on the Wish Tree concerning young

people's facilities, this is from the young people PRESCAP. The 2 wishes on the




#### Workshop Discussion at Community Event

The discussion on issues of local concern produced 4 points that concerned facilities for young people. This constituted 24% of all the comments made.


The adults who participated in the discussion of issues were concerned mainly with the fact that there were a *lack of volunteers in the Youth Centre*, and that a *Youth Worker should be paid for from their rates*. However, there was a concern raised that the *young people should be consulted about what they want to happen in the village*. When asked what they would like to see in the future of the village in the Prescap workshops, the young people produced both imaginative and practical results.

#### The villages comments on Facilities for Young People:



#### Questionnaire

The only question in the questionnaire that relates to activities for young people is Q21. This asks what facilities people would like to see available in their community.



Although the option 'youth club' did not gather the greatest number of responses, (8% compared to the highest at 15%) the questionnaire still demonstrates support for the fact that more young peoples' facilities are required. It is interesting to note that the most popular response, sports facilities with 15% was also a desire highlighted by the young people in their consultation.





#### **About Prescap**

Prescap is an organisation, which uses visual art in a dynamic way to support community development.

Prescap facilitated 2 young people's workshops in Caton-with-Littledale, one in each of the local primary schools. In the session young people were invited to create images of how they would like their village to look, in the form of pictures and collage. These images were then used to see how young people would like to see the parish develop in future.

One workshop asked the questions: What do you think of living in Brookhouse? What do you dislike? What would you like to see change in the future?

The other workshop asked the questions: What do you like about living in your village? What would you like to be different in the future? The workshop evaluation sheet also asked the question: Looking to the future, what would you like your village to be like?

Looking at the outcomes from each of the workshops the results of these can be loosely gathered into the following headings: *Environment Facilities Activities Services Crime Traffic & road safety*

#### Recommendations

- To do further consultation with the young people of the village focusing on the potential user groups of the youth centre.
- Contact the Enterprising Rural Communities team at Community Futures about funding for a feasibility study for the future of the youth and community centre.
- Contact the Vital Villages worker at Community Futures about grants available for increasing activities at the centre.

#### Conclusion

It should be noted that the older young people of Caton have not been consulted through REAL and as the biggest potential users of the centre initially their voices need to be heard. Despite this from the consultation with young people and the wider community it is clear that *steps need to be taken to improve existing facilities* for the young people of Caton as well as *investigate the possibility of providing new ones*.

In the short term, *more adults assisting or volunteering at the Youth Centre* would address some of the concerns raised. However, for the improvement of existing facilities, and the provision of new ones, a feasibility study would need to be carried out, possibly incorporating further consultation work with Caton's young people. This study would be able to ascertain which options are most practical and possible, as well as identifying routes for funding.



### **Traffic & Road Safety**

Coming a very close second to Facilities for Young People, the issue of traffic and road safety is also of great concern in Caton.




Looking first at the discussion of local issues, we can see that of the concerns raised 7 were to do with traffic and road safety. This constitutes 41% of the total of issues raised. This is supported by evidence from the Stick-a-Star method. The option **"Safer Roads for All Users"** received 47 points, 20% of the total. There were 9 wishes on the Wish Tree concerning these matters, and these account for 20% of the total wishes.

Although the questionnaire doesn't ask explicitly about


road safety issues, there are a number of questions regarding the impact that traffic has on quality of life in the parish.

Q37 asks about noise problems experienced by residents of the parish. As we can see from the chart below, 14% of respondents suffer from noise caused by road traffic. Although this does not indicate there is necessarily a safety problem from the traffic, it does show that traffic in itself creates problems within the parish.



The comments, or 'other' section, to Q37 reveal additional traffic related noise problems, including 'boy racers' and 'weekend motorcycles'.

Q39 (see below) asks which environmental problems cause significant trouble to residents of the parish. Again, a large proportion of respondents have indicated there is a problem with traffic. *Speeding Traffic* can be taken to indicate problems with road safety, as this is a common cause of road traffic accidents involving pedestrians and other drivers.




There is an assumption when Road Safety arises as an issue that the problem stems from traffic passing through the village, rather than traffic generated by the residents of a particular place. However, it is worth investigating what possible volume of traffic is generated from within the parish. Of those people responding to the questionnaire 88% have access to a private motor vehicle at all or most times (Q5). In addition, Q7 reveals that 38% of respondents use a car or van to travel to their place of work. This would suggest that at the busiest times of day, residents generate a fair proportion of traffic passing through the parish.

The comments from the discussion day indicate that traffic problems are mostly to do with speeding and congestion. The fact that Caton-with-Littledale lies on the route to Kirby Lonsdale, and therefore several regular bikers meets, is one reasons for the number of motorcycles passing through the parish. There is already a traffic camera on Lancaster Road, and presumably this has gone some way to addressing previous concerns regarding road safety. By contrast the Wish Tree's wishes mostly concern safe pedestrian crossings and enforcing existing speed limits.



The action group should be looking to approach the relevant agencies and individuals (Highways Department at the District Council, the police, Community Safety Partnership) in order to seek support and assistance in addressing these concerns.

Other comments about traffic and road safety:



### Environment

The third highest priority to emerge from the consultation was the issue of the environment. The *upkeep and/or protection of aspects of the built and natural environment locally* were of concern to a great number of people.



The biggest display of concern regarding the local environment came from the Wish Tree. There were 11 wishes concerning the environment, coming to 25% of the overall total. The wishes concerned many individual issues, from dog fouling through the upkeep of local pathways, to the desire for a village pond. Some of the concern over the footpaths is obviously related to restrictions that were in put in place during the Foot

and Mouth Disease crisis of 2001, and may no longer be relevant, but other wishes concerned the extension of the cycle path to Hornby, as well as the old railway line being allowed to be return to its 'natural state'.

The Stick-a-Star allowed parishioners to express their need to conserve and protect the natural environment. 53 points were awarded to the options *Protect Local Wildlife and Nature (37 – 3^{rd} place) and Reduce our impact on the Environment (16 – 4<sup>th</sup> place). Whilst the first can be construed as a need to protect and conserve, the second can be seen as a need to curb human activities that may impact negatively on the environment.* 


The community discussion revealed concerns to do with the upkeep of the physical environment of the parish, particularly litter, hedge cuttings and the state of the picnic site at Bull Beck. These 3 comments constitute 17% of the overall results of the discussion. The picnic site at Bull Beck has received some attention since this consultation.



The young people also registered concern about the environment, in the form of requesting an animal sanctuary in their vision for the future of the parish. Amongst the aspects of life in the parish that the young people like are the quantity of animals, wildlife and being able to walk by, and fish in, the river. Controversially, the young people also said that they like the upside-down trees! When we consider what the young people liked about Caton individual features of the natural environment seemed to be of significant value.

The questionnaire also gave residents of the parish the opportunity to express concern over various environmental matters. As we have already seen (p.16), Q39 of the questionnaire revealed that 34% of residents are concerned with the level of dog-fouling in the parish. This was the largest response to this question. Litter was also considered to be an issue, with 19% of respondents complaining that this was a problem the community suffers from.


Q40 asked which of a number of specific environmental problems were considered to be important to the community. A higher than average number of people chose not to respond to the questions, but despite this concern was clearly registered for all the possible issues raised. Another interesting point to note is that flooding was less of an issue for Caton-with-Littledale than the average of communities engaged with REAL thus far (average -13%, Caton -7%).



The use and upkeep of pathways was raised, particularly in the Wish Tree. Q42 sought to establish what the factors were preventing people from using local paths and bridleways. Although 25% of respondents chose not to answer the question, the next largest responses were 'None of these', and 'Other reasons'. It is impossible to judge exactly what these responses might indicate, but due to the timing it may be assumed that at least a proportion of these responses point to the closure of paths because of Foot and Mouth Disease being the major reason for these paths not being used.

There may be several solutions to the issues raised in this section of the report. Litter and dog fouling could be addressed by increased provision of bins within the parish, and some kind of campaign targeted at litterbugs and unconscientious dog-owners. Litter picks could be organised, possibly involving the young people of the parish. Caton already benefits from participating in Lancashire County Council's Parish Lengthsman Scheme, but it may be worth contacting them to see if this service could be extended or improved.

Comments on the environment of Caton-with-Littledale:



### Services

The lack of, or need to improve, services within the village also arose as an issue from the consultation, although it did not appear to be of as great importance as the three main areas.




The range of services that received mention in the consultation was quite varied. The Stick-a-Star option "*More/Some Local Shops*" received a total of 12 points, and "*Easy Access to Healthcare Services*" was awarded only one point. However, taking these two options together, the issue of services gathered 13 points, or 5% of the total. There was only one comment from the community discussion concerning services, and this

specifically referred to the need for "Household collection of recycled waste". This was echoed in the Wish Tree, with 3 wishes concerning waste collection, both recycled and garden waste. The Wish Tree also had 2 wishes asking for a market for local produce, and 2 wishes for local banking facilities. In addition there was 1 wish for more efficient delivery of 'The Link'. When added up this comes to 8 wishes for improved local services, or 18% of the total wishes on the tree.

#### Shops

In terms of shopping facilities, the village of Caton already has a Co-op shop that opens early in the morning and late into the evening and stocks a range of basic groceries. The questionnaire reveals (Q9 – results below) that most people find it easy to access both a corner shop and a supermarket. The Wish Tree had 2 wishes asking for a market for local produce. Since the REAL consultation a shop called The Herb Stall has opened in Caton who specialise in organic products with an emphasis on local produce.





#### Banking

We can also see from this chart that a number of people have difficulty in accessing banking services – and that out of the choices offered through the questionnaire it is the service people find hardest to access. This is also supported by the wishes on the Wish Tree. Caton has a main road running through it and the traffic results suggest that it has a high volume of traffic passing through the village. It might be worth investigating the possibility of a cash machine as a service for Caton and the surrounding areas.


#### Recycling

Access to recycling facilities is also seen as a problem. Q38 asked why people do not recycle certain items. The main reasons given were the fact that there is no kerbside collection, nor a local collection point. The items that are least recycled are foil, aluminium cans, raw food waste and plastic bags. The most popular items to recycle are paper and glass.

Lancaster District Council is currently piloting a new kerbside collection project, which they are hoping to introduce in the next few years. In the meantime they can be contacted about the feasibility of developing the recycling options at the local collection points.

#### **Healthcare Services**

Once again, we can see from the above chart that the majority of people don't find it difficult to access healthcare services such as local doctor or hospital. The questionnaire asked a series of questions about local healthcare needs. Q23 asked whether a range of services were considered adequate or not.



The overwhelming majority of respondents were happy, apart from in the case of dental services, which were found to be lacking. Also, services for the elderly did not seem to be entirely satisfactory on the basis of this evidence. A number of comments from Q24 (What other healthcare services are needed by the community) pointed to a desire for improvements to the chiropody service, as well as a locally based physiotherapy service.

Q25 revealed that 33% of respondents are responsible for the care of another person. The majority of respondents were responsible for children of school age (21%), 6% were responsible for the care of an elderly person and 6% were responsible for the care of a person with disability or long-term illness. The Wish Tree contained one wish asking for support for local families who may be struggling with low income, or lone parenthood.




### **Social & Recreation**

We have already seen that there is a perceived lack of recreational facilities for the young people of the parish of Caton-with-Littledale. However, the adults of the parish were also dissatisfied with the recreational facilities available, as well as other social aspects of the parish.

The Wish Tree contained 8 wishes concerning recreational facilities. These range from improvements to the existing football nets, to a wish for a Rural Leisure Centre! The Stick-a-Star option *"Improved Recreation and Leisure Facilities"* came in 9<sup>th</sup> place with only 7 points.




The questionnaire's section **Social & Recreation** points to further ideas as to how the recreational and social life of the parish could be improved. Q21 asked what facilities people would like to be available within the community. The 'no response' figure was relatively high, but still many people gave their opinions on what they would like to see. *Sports Activities* came out the highest, with 15% of respondents stating that they would like this in their community.



The 'Other' section of Q21 asked for comments on other activities people would like to see provided locally. These included request for a variety of evening classes, as well as suggestions for jumble sales and swimming baths.




The Village Hall is an important focal centre for the social life of any rural community. Q22 asked how the parish's village hall could be improved to maximise/improve usage.



Most people felt that the hall needs better car parking facilities, but beyond that the respondents generally felt that no improvements were necessary, or didn't know what improvements might be required. This indicates that people are generally happy with the services provided by the Village Institute.

The social and recreational life of a community relies not just on the activities that are available in the local village hall, but in the willingness of people to come together and get involved in local activities. One wish on the wish tree was for "A group who would arrange visits to concerts in Preston, Manchester & Liverpool". This would probably be a local voluntary group. The questionnaire asked whether respondents had been involved recently with local community/voluntary groups.



At 38%, the number of those involved in local groups in Caton, is slightly higher than the average of communities involved in the REAL process so far (34%).



### Crime & Safety


Crime revealed itself as an area for concern from a number of sources amongst the consultation results.

The community discussion provoked 2 comments (12% of total) that concerned crime and safety issues within the parish. The Stick-a-Star option "A *Reduction in Crime*" was awarded 15 points, bringing it into 5<sup>th</sup> place overall, with 6% of the overall total of points. There was a solitary wish on the Wish Tree requesting a greater police presence within the community.




The questionnaire revealed more detailed data on the actual incidence of crime within the parish. Q16 revealed that 10% of respondents had been the victims of one of the types of crime indicated in the question, in the 12 months preceding September 2001. This figure is on a par with other communities involved in the REAL process. Q17 sought to find out how safe respondents felt when walking alone after dark. Overall, those that felt unsafe amounted to 25% of the respondents. When this was broken down between men and women, five times as many women felt unsafe, as did men. However, when these figures are compared to the national average, we see a slightly different picture. Overall, 63%, of respondents to similar polls felt unsafe. The difference is obvious.

Q18 asked about worries respondents might have about having their home burgled, or being the victim of mugging.




On the issue of having one's home broken into the numbers who were worried/not worried remained fairly equal. The total worried (very worried + fairly worried) were again significantly less than the national average (46% as opposed to 58%). On the second issue, of the possibility of being mugged, the majority claimed not to be particularly worried (62%). Once again, the proportion of those respondents who are worried (32%) is lower than the national figure (44%).

However low the actual incidence of crime may be within the parish, it is clear that levels of fear and worry about potential crime remain relatively high. The questionnaire therefore sought to find out how respondents thought crime and safety could be improved within their community. Q19 focussed specifically on this question.



Clearly, it was felt that an increased police presence would be the ideal solution. The second most popular option, of a Neighbourhood Watch scheme, might be best embarked on initially, as it has most chance of immediate success.

### **Housing & Development**



Housing does not seem to be a particularly high priority issue for people in Caton. The question on the Stick-A-Star relating to housing: *More affordable housing* came 6<sup>th</sup> with 14 (6%) of the total points. The issue was not raised through the Wish Tree.

Once again the questionnaire addressed this issue through a number of questions, which gathered general information and opinions.


The majority of respondents (91%) owned their own house As you can see below, affordable housing for local people and housing for young people are the main areas of concern around housing in Caton-with-Littledale.

It is therefore important that these points are considered, before any future housing development takes place.











### **Adult Education**

Local education and employment issues were not identified as a priority through the Stick-A-Star and it received no votes at all, it was also received no mention on the Wish Tree. This would suggest that it is not a priority issue. However the questionnaire suggests that there is some interest in undertaking a part-time course. Possible explanations for the differences for the results could be that different people responded to the questionnaire than attended the consultation day. Or that it is not a priority issue for people, however when the issue has been raised it has provoked a response.

A significant amount (23%) of respondents expressed an interest in undertaking an educational course. Of theses the majority were interested in part-time courses and mostly for leisure purposes. When asked why more parishioners didn't attend courses the reasons were as follows:

- I need career advice first
- Lack of time
- Times of courses
- Not held locally
- Can't find the course I want
- Location of College
- Cost
- No information about courses
- Lack of childcare
- Lack of Transport

The results suggest that one of the key barriers to undertaking an educational course is where the courses are held. One course of action to address this might be to approach the Adult College and Lancaster & Morecambe college about holding courses at a venue in Caton, for example in the Institute.

### **Employment**



The employment issues on the Stick-A-Star chart: *Local Employment Opportunities* and *space/help for local enterprise* were very low scoring receiving 4 and 3 points respectively. However they were a priority for some people. The issue was not addressed directly on the Wish Tree either. The questions in the questionnaire relating to employment focus on status of employment, income and business start-up. They provide some information about the respondents and indicate that there is some interest in setting up in business.

The biggest category of respondents is the retired (45%) followed by those in full-time employment (26%), Part-time employed (13%), self-employed (6%), looking after family and home (5%). 2% are unable to work due to long-term ill health or disability and 1% are a student and 1% unemployed. This suggests that unemployment is not an issue for the questionnaire respondents. The question should be asked whether this is because there is small-scale



unemployment in Caton or that the consultation process has failed to engage those who are out of work.



6% of respondents were interested in going self-employed. The nature of the businesses were various and included IT, horticulture, care work, tourism, financial/insurance, kitchen design, student housing and training (management). When asked if they were more likely to start-up in business if more support were available 5% of respondents said yes. As 6% expressed an interest in going self-employed this would indicate that such a service would be of benefit to those wanting to start up in business.

### Epilogue

#### A few words from the Parish Council by Bruce Alexander, Clerk to the Parish Council

Although the Parish Council has not taken a lead in the production of this report they are extremely interested in its findings and are already taking steps to address some of the concerns highlighted. The Parish Council will consider the report in detail in the forthcoming months and will use it to inform their decision making in future.

In the meantime it may be helpful to identify actions already being taken in the following areas:

#### Facilities for young people

The main provider is the youth club, which is working hard to re-invent itself as a Drop-in centre and attract funding for a full time youth worker. A representative from the Parish Council sits on the youth club committee.

The Parish Council has recently made grants to the Mother and Toddler Group and will consider application from others.

#### Traffic & Road Safety

This has long been a concern and finally we may have achieved a breakthrough. The Parish Council has recently provided a new car park off Hornby Road to service the local shops. This in turn will allow the Village Store to remove parking from its forecourt and provide the criteria for the County Council to provide a zebra crossing to Hornby Road. We are lobbying hard for funding and we await the outcome of hopefully in the New Year.

Liaison is ongoing with the Police regarding Motor Cycles and speeding cars. These are a problem over the whole district and recently a mobile speed enforcement vehicle has been deployed.

#### Environment

The Parish Council contributes to the Lengthsman scheme and tales a lead in encouraging residents to 'look after' their village. Caton and Brookhouse have done well in the past in the Best Kept Village Competition and we will continue to promote good practice in the village. There are a number of 'dog bins' throughout the village and the dog warden is informed if and when dog bins become a problem. Dog owners need to be responsible for their animals. The Parish Council has been successful in lobbying the City Council to replace the picnic tables at Bull Beck and is trying to get the pot holes repaired.

#### Crime & Safety

The Parish Council maintains good relationships with the local 'Bobbies' but due to circumstances outside their control they have a large 'beat' to cover. At least we have managed a presence in the village, which was not the case a few years ago.

#### Housing

The Parish Council comments on planning applications and has an input into long-term plans for the area. They try to reflect the views of residents, plan for change but attempt to maintain the character of the villages.
